Dear IBBY Friends

2015 was a worrying year with terrorist attacks and wars that have made millions of scared people take flight in search of a safer life. None of us can escape the sometimes, cruel world events, even though we would like to.

Jella Lepman, founder of IBBY, wrote in honour of the first international children's book fair in Munich in 1946, that children hold no responsibility for war, regardless of the side they are on. IBBY continues her work by working to protect the rights of the child on all sides. When these rights are being violated, we will always choose to protect the child.

IBBY Italy gave us a perfect example when they chose to help the flood of refugee children arriving on the small island of Lampedusa in the Mediterranean. The political leaders of Europe had not moved an inch by the time the IBBY international community had rallied around this project.

In 2015 IBBY and its partners called on the US Government to care for the thousands of unaccompanied refugee children and families after they cross the Mexican/USA border on their incredible journeys from their war-torn and violent homelands in search of a place to live and grow.

Thanks to these activities, refugee children will be introduced and welcomed to the library and will be seen as individuals. A human being is a human being. A child is a child. An individual. Not an anonymous statistic. Books and reading save lives and give traumatised children a chance to become whole, contributing citizens as they grow up. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all who were involved in these important projects.

The first year of my IBBY presidency was a busy one and I have been invited as guest and speaker all over the world. It has been such a joy and inspiration to meet so many dedicated IBBY people.

Thousands of IBBY members all over the world are engaged in countless reading projects, campaigns that promote reading, literature awards, international children's book day activities, workshops, 'meet and greets', congresses and projects in crisis areas. IBBY members work to promote a reading culture and give every child the opportunity to become a life-long reader.

Thanks to the use of social media, there is a growing interest in IBBY's activities, especially among young people. The strength of IBBY is derived from its members, starting with its rich

history of world figures such as Jella Lepman, Erich Kästner, Astrid Lindgren and Pamela Travers, up to the present-day 77 National Sections. Always IBBY has believed that every child everywhere in the world must have access to books and the opportunity to become a reader in the fullest sense. We see this as a fundamental right and the doorway to empowerment for every child.

New Year is not just the time to reflect upon the past, but also the perfect moment to look into the future and contemplate what this New Year might bring.


